Mobilize Ohio's various service systems to connect youth with incarcerated parents and their families with resources that promote family functioning and stability in their local communities Systematically integrate a series of evidence-based interventions known as Creating Lasting Family Connections (CLFC) into communities and reentry systems across Ohio Implement CLFC in various settings (in ODRC facilities and in the community) to promote healthy family reintegration, improved quality of family relationships and provide opportunities for positive youth development among youth with incarcerated parents
